

September: World Central Kitchen

Bringing Food, Comfort, and Community Where It's Needed Most

Founded in 2010, World Central Kitchen (WCK) provides fresh, nourishing meals after disasters worldwide. Guided by the belief that "food is a universal human right," WCK partners with local chefs, volunteers, and food producers to respond swiftly to crises—from hurricanes to humanitarian emergencies. Serving millions across dozens of countries, WCK brings not only food but also dignity, connection, and hope in times of need.

October: Avenues

Supporting security and awareness for victims of domestic and sexual violence

Abide in Love Extending Love Across Boundaries

Born from concern for immigrant detainees at the Phelps County jail, Abide in Love is an outreach organization rooted in Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s philosophy of nonviolence. Led by local volunteers, it affirms detainees' humanity through care, connection, and hope. Volunteers send postcards, provide care packages, and offer financial support, reminding detainees they are not forgotten. Join this work by praying for detainees and supporting Abide in Love through Trinity's Second **Sunday Offering on September 14.** Your donations will go to the detainees' commissary accounts so they can make phone calls to their lawyers or relatives.

Little Free Pantry

Just outside our church building stands a simple wooden pantry with a big mission: to share God's love in practical ways. Stocked through the generosity of parishioners and friends, the Little Free Food Pantry is open around the clock. This ministry is available to those in immediate need. "Take what you need, give what you can, but above all, be blessed." There is also a Narcan box on the side of the pantry. Though small in size, this pantry is a powerful reminder that even the simplest gifts can bring hope, nourishment, and dignity to our neighbors. It is one more way we live out Christ's call to care for one another.



The Instructed Euchgrist

An Invitation to Engage, Learn and Be Transformed

The liturgy of the Episcopal Church is a tapestry woven from ancient tradition, reverent symbolism, and the vibrant participation of the entire community—threads that span centuries of living Christian faith. At its heart lies the Holy Eucharist, also known as Holy Communion: a sacred celebration that not only commemorates but also invites us to mystically participate in Jesus Christ's Last Supper.



While many of us may recognize the familiar movements and words of our worship, the profound meaning and history interlaced within each gesture, prayer, and element often go unspoken. To illuminate these deeper layers, Trinity Episcopal Church will offer an "Instructed Eucharist" —a regular Holy Communion service enriched by thoughtful pauses for brief explanations along the way on **September 14.**

During this Eucharist, teaching moments will be gracefully woven into the flow of worship. This practice transforms the experience from passive attendance to mindful engagement, inviting us to become not just a witness but an active seeker of understanding. Guided by Carrol, who will preside, Maria will guide us on this journey, with special attention paid to how the Eucharist unveils the symbolic and spiritual significance behind each part of the service.

The familiar rhythm of worship will be transformed into a living classroom by pausing to reflect and learn. We will uncover the biblical and historical roots that shape the prayers and rituals we cherish, gaining new appreciation for traditions we have practiced for years. Children, newcomers and those from other denominations will be empowered to join in with insight rather than simple imitation. At the same time, longtime Episcopalians may find new meaning in words and actions that once seemed routine.

The Eucharist will offer more than a lesson—it is an invitation to enter more deeply into the sacred mystery of God's grace. By providing clear explanations along the way, the Church affirms that every word, gesture, and symbol in our liturgy is meant to awaken us to Christ's presence among us. In this way, ancient words and actions no longer remain distant or obscure; instead, they come alive as timeless expressions of faith, hope, and love—gifts to be cherished, lived, and joyfully shared with the world.



Hospitality is a core value at Trinity. On the second and fourth Sundays of each month at 5 p.m., our Community Meals offer more than food. They provide welcome, dignity, and connection to all who come through our doors. Rooted in our mission to serve all without exception, these meals reflect Christ's call to love our neighbors.

Funded partly by the diocese, the program is open to everyone—there is no registration or requirement. Whether you face food insecurity, live on a fixed income, are away from home, or seek fellowship, there's a place for you at our table.

Volunteers make each meal possible — people of all ages and abilities who cook, serve, set up, and clean with joy and generosity. In giving their time, they discover something more profound: a ministry that transforms both those who are served and those who serve. Here, strangers become neighbors. Stories are shared. Spirits are lifted. For families, it's a shared moment around the table. For the lonely, it's a space to be seen and known. And for all of us at Trinity, it's a chance to live out our faith—not just in words, but in action.

Come. Be fed. Be known. Be part of something holy.





Keeping the Table Set

Our community dinners have flourished over the past few months. With a mix of home-cooked and catered meals, we have shared food, fellowship, and welcome with neighbors. One guest recently shared that after bringing her husband home from the hospital the day of the dinner, she told him, "I hope you'll be okay for a little while, because I really need to see my community." We had considered not applying for the grant again, but her words reminded us how deeply these meals matter and gave us the resolve to continue.

As we prepare to reapply for the grant, we recognize the need to make this ministry more sustainable. One exciting step forward is to invite Trinity and the wider community volunteers to join us in the kitchen on selected Saturdays. Together we'll prepare ingredients for an upcoming Sunday meal and freeze extras for future gatherings. This will help us lower costs and deepen the bonds of fellowship already growing around the table.

We also pause to remember with gratitude the late Pam Ryan, whose dedication and vision drove this ministry. With her passing, we feel both the gift of her example and the reality of a large void in our leadership. We need your hands and leadership—whether chopping vegetables, organizing the freezer, leading a team, or simply showing up with a willing spirit.






A Journey Through 'The Spirituality of Imperfection'

Our next Adult Formation class will be held on Saturdays at 11:30 a.m. at Maxwell's, beginning on September 13. Our next book will be The Spirituality of Imperfection: Storytelling and the Search for Meaning by Ernest Kurtz and Katherine Ketcham.

Through this book, we will explore how understanding our limitations and accepting the inevitability of failure and pain can actually ease our hurt and move us toward a greater sense of serenity and selfawareness. he book bridges multiple faith traditions and secular forms of self-help (for instance, the

spirituality of 12-step groups) through vivid storytelling and thoughtful commentary. It's an excellent way to begin forgiving ourselves for the things God had long ago forgiven us.

Nurturing Faith Across Generations: Intergenerational Faith Formation

At Trinity, we recognize that while children learn important lessons at church, actual faith formation begins at home. Children's spiritual foundations are laid within the family—through conversations about faith and witnessing how parents live out their baptismal covenant. Though we strive to provide faith formation opportunities within our church community, we continue to imagine new ways to support the unique needs and hopes of parents and their children.



Our intergenerational events are designed to foster both learning and meaningful conversation between parents and children. These gatherings offer educational experiences and suggest ways families can continue exploring faith together beyond our church walls.

This fall, our upcoming events will include:

September:

Holy Hardware

We will showcase and discuss the sacred items used during Eucharistic services, such as the paten, ciborium, chalice, corporal, and Sanctus bells. Children will receive drawings of these objects to color, helping them engage with the symbols of our liturgy in a hands-on way.

October:

Instructed Eucharist

Families are invited to participate in a brief, guided Eucharist, deepening their understanding of its meaning and traditions.
